Barry Sugerman, Architect of Possibilities

Barry Sugerman, Bay Harbor, passed away on April 16, 2013. He was 75 years young.

Born on September 19, 1937, he was the son of Lourraine and George. He came to Miami Beach from Brooklyn at two years of age with his parents and his sister, Roberta. Since the time he was able to walk, he was fascinated with all of the construction sites in booming Miami Beach and the beautiful landscapes set against the sea and sky. He knew from a very tender age that he wanted to be an architect. He graduated from Miami Beach Senior High School in 1955 (Go Typhoons) where his athletic achievements are still the talk of the town to those that knew him. He was inducted into the high school's Hall of Fame in 2003. He graduated from Georgia Tech where he won almost every track and field competition in which he participated, including a state championship in the pole vault event. During his college years, his parents would drive up from Miami Beach to attend every event, and he talked about that often with great pride. Barry attained the rank of captain in the U.S. Air Force. After serving in the military, Barry started his architecture practice in North Miami, and launched his brilliant career which lasted the rest of his life. He specialized in designing custom homes, both new and remodeled, providing both architecture and interior design. He has been widely featured in both local and national magazines, and has won more than 140 national and regional awards, including the Golden Aurora Awards in 1992 and 2004, and the Best in America Living Award – House of The Year in 1993. He enjoyed the possibilities he always discovered when designing and renovating spaces all over the United States, Honduras, the Cayman Islands, and even Turkey. He delighted in his craft and wrote several books so that he could share his expertise with homeowners, designers and builders. With all of his successes, Barry remained a modest man of good humor and

genuine sensitivity. He was a devoted husband to his adoring wife, Barbara (his honey-bunny), for 36 exciting, never-boring, wonderful years. He often said that “if one has the patience, desire, proclivity, time, and talent to do something, the results will be astounding.” And for him, they always were.
